

The National Program: 2023 in Retrospect

Throughout 2023, transition, transformation, and growth defined Project Archaeology. The Program, a mere seed of an idea in the late 1980s, has matured and flourished over more than 30 years due to the passion, knowledge, and experience of innumerable archaeologists, descendant community members, informal and formal educators, historic preservationists, and other heritage practitioners.

Within the past year, Project Archaeology experienced a massive operational transition – replanting the Program with two new national partners. Southern Utah University (SUU) in Cedar City, Utah serves as the new operational headquarters while the Institute for Heritage Education (IHE), a national heritage education non-profit based in Montana, provides funding, leadership, and curriculum guidance. The new national partnerships will revitalize, rebuild, manage, and support the Program and the National Network while also maintaining its vision, identity, and reputation. These changes will continue to nourish and sustain Project Archaeology. The Program – like an ever-growing oak tree – stands tall and strong.

Project Archaeology remains committed to providing superior professional development that reaches educators as well as generating high-quality educational materials that are utilized in classrooms. As the Program grows, our passionate network of archaeology educators will continue to pursue a world in which all people understand and appreciate their own culture and history as well as the culture and history of others. Together we will transform classrooms and learning spaces into communities of student archaeologists who connect culture to their own lives and desire to protect our shared past.



The Leadership Team (LT) is a designated advisory group comprised of individuals who represent the network of Project Archaeology Program partners. LT sets direction for the National Program, identifies and recommends new partnerships, assists with problem-solving and decisionmaking, and offers guidance for ongoing operational transitions within the National Office and the National Network. The group met in-person in Cedar City, UT last October. The three-day retreat resulted in numerous outcomes centered on establishing the "Big Vision" for Archaeology and understanding the problems the Program solves.

Shape the Future of Project Archaeology: Meeting Needs and Making Opportunities Survey

For the past 33 years, Project Archaeology has developed and refined a national program that focuses on best practices in archaeology education. Protecting archaeological sites, connecting schoolchildren to the past, building trusted relationships with stakeholders, and creating a National Network of archaeology educators we also remained major components of the program.

Network Survey

- Archaeology educators shared experiences and suggestions to shape the Program's direction
- 88 people participated
- Representation from 32 states,

State Programs
